He lauded the leadership of JU Vice Chancellor, Prof. Umesh Rai, for steering the University to new heights with focus on academic excellence and infrastructural development.

55th Foundation Day of JU: VC unfolds vision, spells out achievements

Sharing the impressive accomplishments of the University of Jammu, Vice Chancellor Prof Umesh Rai noted with a sense of pride its rise in the National Institutional Ranking Framework (NIRF-2024), securing the 50th position in the University Category and 23rd among State Public Universities.

In a media interaction, the Vice Chancellor highlighted the Business School's success, ranking 18th in The Week's Government B-School category, solidifying its reputation as a leading management institution.

In an effort to protect and promote the rich cultural heritage of the Jammu region, Prof Rai introduced "Jammuriyat," a thematic series designed to preserve, celebrate and disseminate local traditions. This initative not only aims to safeguard Jammu's culture but also to strengthen the University's connection with the community, he said.

Prof Rai also spoke about "Goonj-2024," an initiative aimed at encouraging the holistic development of students through a combination of cul-



tural, sports, and academic activities. He emphasized the impact of the newly implemented Samarth ERP system, poised to enhance efficiency and transparency across the University's administrative processes.

Highlighting the University's collaborative efforts, Prof Rai informed about the partnerships with key organizations such as the Office of the Chief Electoral Officer, J&K, the FICCI Ladies Organization J&K and Ladakh Chapter, and the Airports Authority of India. These collaborations aim to ad-

vance electoral awareness, empower women, and provide students with unique internship opportunities. Additionally, new agreements with BSE Institute Limited and Growbyte IT Providers Pvt. Ltd. will further develop skills in finance and technology.

Prof Dinesh Singh calls for bridging gap between mathematical theory, its practical uses

VC highlights role of mathematics in advancing various branches of science

Emphasizing the importance of making mathematics relevant to real-world applications and societal benefits, Vice Chairman, Higher Education Council J&K UT Padma Shri Prof. Dinesh Singh, has urged teachers to help students recognize the value of the subject in addressing societal challenges and to bridge the gap between mathematical theory and its practical uses.

Inaugurating the three-day National Seminar on 'Recent Trends in Analysis and Allied Areas" and the 31st Annual Conference of Jammu Mathematical Society(JMS), organized by the Department of Mathematics, Prof Singh shared his insights with the delegates from across the country.

Highlighting the evolving technological landscape, Prof. Singh, who was Chief Guest, encouraged educators to adapt their teaching methods to make mathematics more accessible and understandable for students.

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Psychology of Drug addiction

rug addiction in India is a growing public health issue, exacerbated by factors such as socio-economic disparities, limited mental health resources, and increasing drug availability. Substance abuse often intersects with mental health disorders, leading to significant social and economic challenges. The situation is further complicated by stigma, which hinders access to treatment and support. Efforts are being made through government initiatives and non-governmental organizations to address the crisis, but more comprehensive strategies needed to tackle the root causes and provide effective treatment and prevention.

The psychology of drug addiction involves an intricate blend of cognitive, emotional, and social factors that drive individuals to use and often become dependent on substances. Here's an in-depth look at the psychological aspects of drug addiction:

Psychological Mechanisms

Positive Reinforcement: Drugs provide immediate pleasurable effects, which can reinforce continued use. This positive reinforcement makes the behavior more likely to be repeated as the brain becomes conditioned to seek out these rewarding experiences.

Tolerance and Dependence: With repeated use, individuals often develop tolerance, requiring larger amounts of the substance to achieve the same effects. Physical dependence can develop as the body adapts to the drug's presence, leading to withdrawal symptoms when the drug is not available.

Craving and Relapse: Cravings are intense desires to use the drug, triggered by various internal and external cues. Even after periods of abstinence, these cravings can lead to relapse, as the psychological and physiological conditioning associated with the drug remains strong.

Behavioral Conditioning: Drug use can become a conditioned behavior. For instance, if drug use is associated with specific environments or social situations, those contexts can become triggers for drug-seeking behavior.

Escapism: Drugs provide an escape from reality and can temporarily alleviate feelings of boredom, dissatisfaction, or distress. For individuals facing socio-economic challenges, addiction can become a means to temporarily disconnect from their problems.

Emotional Factors


Coping Mechanism: Many individuals use drugs as a way to cope with negative emotions or psychological distress, such as anxiety, depression, or trauma. Drugs can provide temporary relief or escape from these emotional issues.

Self-Medication: People with untreated mental health disorders may use substances to self-medicate. For instance, someone suffering from anxiety or depression might use alcohol or sedatives to alleviate their symptoms, which can worsen their condition over time.

Biological and Genetic Influences

Brain Chemistry: Drugs affect the brain's reward system by altering neurotransmitter activity, particularly dopamine, which is linked to pleasure and reinforcement. This alteration creates intense feelings of euphoria, reinforcing the desire to repeat the drug use.

Genetic Vulnerability: Genetic factors can predispose individuals to addiction. Research suggests that certain genetic variations can affect how individuals respond to drugs and how susceptible they are to developing addiction.



Cognitive Factors

Cognitive Distortions: Addicts often hold distorted beliefs about their drug use, such as believing they can control their consumption or that the benefits outweigh the risks. These cognitive distortions help maintain the addiction by minimizing the perceived negative consequences.

Decision-Making: Drug addiction can impair decision-making abilities. Individuals may prioritize immediate rewards over long-term consequences, leading to continued substance use despite adverse effects on their health, relationships, and life.

Beliefs and Attitudes: Individuals may develop beliefs that drug use is necessary for social acceptance, relaxation, or to handle problems. These beliefs can reinforce drug use and make quitting more challenging.

Denial and Rationalization: Addicts may engage in denial, minimizing the impact of their drug use, or rationalize their behavior, convincing themselves that their use is justified or not as problematic as it actually is.

Social and Environmental Factors

Peer Influence: Social environments and peer groups play a significant role in drug use. Being in a social circle where drug use is common or encouraged can increase the likelihood of starting and continuing drug use.

Stress and Life Events: Stressful life events, such as financial problems, relationship issues, or job loss, can contribute to drug addiction. Drugs are often used as a means to escape or manage these stressors.

Family Dynamics: Family history of addiction, dysfunctional family relationships, or exposure to substance use within the family can increase the risk of addiction. Family environment can also impact both the onset of addiction and its treatment.

Psychological Impact of Addiction

Mental Health Disorders: Addiction frequently co-occurs with other mental health disorders, such as depression, anxiety, or personality disorders. These co-occurring conditions can complicate treatment and recovery efforts.

Cognitive Impairments: Chronic drug use can impair cognitive functions, including memory, attention, and executive functioning. These impairments can hinder the ability to recognize the negative impacts of drug use and to make effective decisions about treatment.

Emotional Instability: Drug addiction can lead to emotional instability, with increased mood swings, irritability, and difficulty regulating emotions. This can further exacerbate existing psychological issues and create a cycle of substance use and emotional distress.

Treatment and Recovery

Behavioral Therapies: Therapies such as Cognitive Behavioral Therapy (CBT) focus on identifying and changing harmful thought patterns and behaviors associated with drug use. CBT helps individuals develop healthier coping strategies and address underlying psychological issues.

Motivational Enhancement: Motivational Interviewing (MI) is designed to help individuals explore and resolve ambivalence about quitting drugs. It enhances motivation to change by focusing on personal goals and values.

Support Networks: Building a strong support network through family, friends, and support groups is crucial for recovery. Social support provides encouragement, accountability, and a sense of belonging, which can aid in overcoming addiction.

Integrated Treatment: For individuals with co-occurring mental health disorders, integrated treatment approaches that address both substance abuse and mental health issues simultaneously are often the most effective.

Understanding the psychology of drug addiction involves recognizing the complex interplay between biological predispositions, psychological mechanisms, and social influences. Effective treatment and prevention strategies must address these various aspects to support individuals in overcoming addiction and achieving long-term recovery.

During the 1921-22 food crisis that threatened the Valley with famine, it was his strategic insight and tireless efforts that averted catastrophe. His handling of the situation not only saved countless lives but also solidified his place in the hearts of

By the time he ascended the throne in 1925, the state was enmeshed in political intrigue, with divisive forces conspiring to unravel the social fabric so carefully nurtured by his predecessors. The agents of the colonial apparatus, along with self-serving political factions, had begun to destabilize the region's syncretic cultural space. A realist with keen insight, Maharaja Hari Singh met these challenges head-on, famously declaring, "I have no religion; my religion is justice." This proclamation was far more than a political gesture—it became the guiding principle of his rule. His actions soon demon-

words, as seen in his 11-point reform agenda, which aimed to improve education, healthcare, irrigation, forest rights, and land ownership. His liberal outlook and unwavering dedication to public welfare earned him widespread praise, with Kashmiri Muslim organizations hailing him as a "highly enlightened ruler under whose wise and sympathetic guidance the people of this great state are sure to advance in various spheres of human activity.'

The welfare of the peasantry was especially close to his heart. In 1926, he enacted the Agriculturist's Relief Regulation, which capped interest rates at 12% per annum to free farmers from the stranglehold of debt. Notably, this progressive law was not only applied to agriculturalists but extended to those in horticulture and pastoral economies, at a time when such reforms were uncommon even in British India. Maharaja Hari Singh didn't stop there—he pioneered a coop erative movement, deploying state officers to educate rural masses about the benefits of cooperative credit. By 1942, the state boasted 1,491 cooperative societies, with a capital of Rs. 24,86,708—a remarkable achievement for the time

Further social reforms under his rule radically altered Jammu and Kashmir's rural landscape. The Land Alienation Regulation of 1933, along with other legislative measures like the Agriculturalists and Land Improvement Act, gave peasants unprecedented rights and protections. His livestock improvement initiatives and the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Act also reflected his wide-reaching concern for both human and animal welfare.

Maharaja Hari Singh's social reform agenda extended into areas that many rulers hesitated to address, especially the status of women. In 1927 and 1928, he established two Women's Welfare Associations to address issues such as child marriage, widow remarriage, prostitution, and human

trafficking. Remarkably, despite his often-tense relationship with the British Empire, he enlisted several Englishmen to aid in

him both criticism and admi-



In the realm of education, his contributions were equally transformative. He founded numerous schools in rural areas, raised academic standards, and ensured that Muslim teachers were appointed in predominantly Muslim neighborhoods. Responding to demands from the All India Kashmiri Muslim Conference, he introduced free and compulsory primary education and supported female education, following recommendations from the 1938 Education Reorganization Committee. In the sphere of healthcare, too, his initiatives were groundbreaking, significantly improving access to medical services across the state.


The sweeping reforms of Maharaja Hari Singh, a beacon of progress and visionary leadership, were tragically interrupted by the seismic upheaval of 1947. As the British Raj crumbled, Jammu and Kashmir was engulfed in the chaos of partition. In this tumultuous moment, the Maharaja resolutely chose to be part of India, guiding his state onto the path of democratic peace and progress. His courageous decision not only altered the course of history but also left an indelible mark on the legacy of Jammu and Kashmir, affirming his commitment to the welfare and unity of his people. His vision continues to inspire a proud narrative of, patriotism, resilience and hope.

When we step back and gaze upon the broader canvas of his life and legacy of Maharaja Hari Singh, we behold a ruler who masterfully navigated the treacherous waters of his era. His legacy is not merely one of loyalty and patriotism; it is a vibrant tapestry woven with the threads of comprehensive reforms, a steadfast stand against colonial exploitation, and a selfless surrender of power for the greater good of his people. In reclaiming his story, we uncover the true essence of a leader who fought not just for his own state, but for the very soul of India itself.

The declaration of a public holiday on Maharaja Hari Singh's birthday, and the growing celebrations in recent years, are heartening signs of recognition—yet they

remain but small steps in acknowledging his profound historical significance. What is truly needed, however, is a deeper, critical re-evaluation of Maharaja Hari Singh's life and legacy. The time has come for scholars to undertake an objective study of his multifaceted contributions, using fresh sources and adopting more nuanced perspectives. Maharaja Hari Singh deserves to be remembered not just as a ruler of Jammu and Kashmir, but as one of the most pivotal figures of the 20th century.

This noble task cannot rest solely upon the shoulders of historians and academics; it demands a collective endeavor—a harmonious alliance of educational institutions, civil society, and all who cherish the values he embodied. Together, let us honor Maharaja Hari Singh's memory by restoring him to his rightful place in history, celebrated not just as a monarch, but as a visionary reformer whose enduring legacy continues to inspire. May our voices rise in unison, for the call for recognition is one that must be

JU collaborates on new Int'l Project to address landslide risks in Himalayas

JAMMU

In a significant step towards addressing the growing risks of landslides in the Himalayan region, the University of Jammu is playing a pivotal role in an international research collaboration aimed at mitigating the impact of landslides.

The project, led by the University of Aberdeen (UK), seeks to enhance understanding of these catastrophic events, which have become more frequent due to climate change.

The collaboration brings together experts from India and the UK, with more than £1 million in combined funding from the Natural Environment Research Council (NERC), UK Research and Innovation (UKRI), and India's Ministry of Earth Sciences (MoES). The research will focus on the Central Himalayan region, an area increasingly vulnerable to landslides due to rapid infrastructure development, population growth, and the rising frequency of extreme weather events.

Prof. Kavita Suri from the University of Jammu, who has a background in social sciences and community engagement, is part of this team, which in-cludes geoscientists, remote sensing specialists, and experts in geotechnical analysis from prominent Indian institutions such as the Birbal Sahni Institute of Palaeosciences, Jawaharlal Nehru University, University of Jammu, GB Pant National Institute of Himpley tional Institute of Himalayan Environment, and the Borehole Geophysics Research Laboratory. In fact, University of Jammu is one of the only two Universities in India, which are part of this prestigious interna-

tional project. Prof. Suri's involvement in this project follows earlier studies conducted by the University of Jammu on landslide hazards



and cascading glacial events in the Himalayan region. The current research aims to integrate various scientific and social datasets. creating robust methodologies for landslide risk assessment and impact mitigation. She will contribute her expertise in exploring community perceptions of landslide hazards. This social dimension will be crucial in developing locally acceptable and effective mitigation strategies. These partners will work in unison to map and monitor landslide risks using

cutting-edge technology, including satellite, drone, and treering data analysis.

Dr. Anshuman Bhardwaj, Project Lead and Senior Lecturer in Geosciences at the University of Aberdeen, emphasized the importance of this re-

"Our project will bridge critical gaps in understanding the nexus between geohazards, human activity, and infrastruc-ture. By providing comprehen-sive hazard assessments, we aim to bolster community resilience and improve preparedness for future landslides", Dr. Bhardwaj said.

As extreme weather patterns persist and landslides continue to devastate communities, the work of Prof. Suri and her colleagues will inform vital policy decisions on infrastructure development and disaster preparedness across high-mountain regions. The research will provide improved understanding of the relationship between slope failure mechanisms and slope materials, analyse and reconstruct past landslide events using tree-ring records, and model potentially destructive future glacial landslide events.

The ground-breaking project integrates multiple disciplines to cover all aspects of landslides in a high- mountain catchment and will serve as a benchmark for similar research in other landslide-prone high- mountain regions, contributing to effective monitoring and mitigation of geohazards.

Project Co-Lead Dr Lydia Sam, lecturer in Geosciences at the University of Aberdeen, added: There is a lack of comprehensive hazard assessment models that consider both, the environmental as well as social aspects and our project is a much-needed step in that direction."

Indian Project Lead Dr S. Nawaz Ali explained: "The project will inform policymakers about landslide-prone regions, ensuring sustainable development of critical infra-structure. Mitigation strategies, such as identifying optimal shelter locations, alternative routes for food supply,
