The dockyard boasts an impressive array of facilities, including dry docks, workshops, and specialized equipment, enabling it to handle a wide range of naval vessels, from submarines to destroyers. The dockyard serves as a training center for naval personnel, imparting specialized skills in shipbuilding, maintenance, and repair. The Naval Dockyard is a Mumbai's major generating contributor to economy, employment and supporting local businesses. The Naval Dockyard remains at the forefront of India's naval modernization efforts, continuously upgrading its facilities and capabilities to meet the evolving challenges of maritime security. A group of enthusiastic students from Naval Dockyard in Mumbai recently embarked on an educational and inspiring visit to the formidable Vishakhapatnam destroyer D66, docked at the Eastern Naval Command headquarters in Vishakhapatnam.

#### Visakhapatnam Destroyer D66

The Visakhapatnam-class destroyer D66 is a potent warship of the Indian Navy. Named after the coastal city of Visakhapatnam, the destroyer is armed with a formidable arsenal of weapons and sensors, making it a formidable force at sea. The destroyer is capable of anti-ship, anti-submarine, and air defense missions. The Sindhu Ghosh-class submarines are a series of diesel-electric submarines that have been in service with the Indian Navy since the 1980s. The submarines are based on the Soviet Kilo-class design, and they are capable of carrying a variety of weapons, including torpedoes, mines, and anti-ship missiles.

INS Sindhu Ghosh is one of the Sindhu Ghosh-class submarines, and it is currently based at the Naval Dockyard in Mumbai. The submarine has been in service with the Indian Navy since 1987, and it has undergone several refits and upgrades during its time in service.
