J&K WITNESSES TRANQUIL ELECTIONS AFTER DECADES

Jammu: Jammu & Kashmir is one of the diverse states in India represented by 5 six seats in the Lok Sabha. Earlier, Ladakh was also considered one of the constituencies of Jammu and Kashmir until its recognition as a separate Union territory in 2019. The current estimated population of J&K is approximately 1.56 crore where there are 8.69 million voters in Jammu & Kashmir. Baramulla, Srinagar, Anantnag, Udhampur, and Jammu are the 5 constituencies in the state. BJP, Congress, Jammu & Kashmir National Conference (JKNC), Jammu and Kashmir People's Democratic Party (JKPDP), Communist Party of India (CPI(M)), Democratic Progressive Azad Party (DPAP) are some of the major political parties that contest to win a seat from the state. For the Lok Sabha elections, BJP has fielded Dr Jitendra Singh from Udhampur and Jugal Kishore Sharma from Jammu. Both the NDA and JKNC are likely to contest independently from all 5 seats. After 15 years, the Udhampur Lok Sabha seat in Jammu and Kashmir is neaded for a keen contest, with prominent leaders in the fray from the BJP and Congress. Both Jitendra Singh of the BJP, a Union Minister of State, and Choudhary Lal Singh of the Congress are two-time MPs from the seat. While Jitendra Singh has won the seat the past two times (2014 and 2019) by big margins, it was won twice previously by Lal Singh (2004 and 2009). "There should be 100% voting. If Narendra Modi becomes Prime Minister for the third time, then I want to appeal to him that we should think about the general category, who are already

struggling", Manik Goswami student of Law Department, JU. Sarfraz Ahmad stu-dent University of Jammu "Voting is our fundamental right. Youth should read the manifesto of every political party and then decide where to cast their vote. Even media is controlled by higher officials and we want that media should also put our de mands in front of Government Vaishali Sharma, student Botany Department, JU: I belong to Nowshera which is in district Rajouri and our polling constituency is Anantnag, Rajouri Lok Sabha constituency, I am very excited to cast the first vote of my life and I am aware of all the candidates of my area and know where to cast my vote. Jammu and Kashmir are witnessing healthy elections. This is the first election in Jammu and Kashmir after Article 370 was abrogated by the Centre in 2019. The Jammu-Reasi seat comprises 18 Assembly segments and nine segments crossed 70% polling, with Akhnoor recording 74.03%, Bishnah 71.33%, Chhamb 71.06%, Gulabgarh 71.47%, Marh 73%, Nagrota 71.39%, Reasi 71.65%, Shri Mata Vaishno Devi 74.65%, and Vijaypur 75.67%. Peaceful and brisk polling was recorded in the Jammu-Reasi Lok Sabha seat in Jammu and Kashmir, which has nine Assembly segments adjacent to the International Border (IB) and the Line of Control (LoC), and clocked 71.91% polling on April 19.

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Marh 73%, Nagrota 71.39%, Reasi 71.65%, Shri Mata Vaishno Devi 74.65%, and Vijaypur 75.67%. The Udhampur Lok Sabha constituency in Jammu and Kashmir witnessed a massive participation of voters from all sections of society on Friday as it recorded 65.08% voter turnout by 5 p.m. Amid multi-tier security arrange-ments, 'Nari Shakti'(women power) was on display at the all women staffed booths known as 'pink booths', in the cim Jammu and Kashmir Lok Sabha elections. These 'pink booths' attracted more women voters. The commission after considering the report from the UT administration as well as analyzing the ground situation prevailing in the constituency, has decided under Section 56 of the Representation of People Act, 1951, to revise the date of poll in the said Parliamentary Constituency in respect of ongoing General Election to Lok Sabha, 2024. Anantnag-Rajouri Parliamentary Constituency too has shattered voter turnout records, with 51.35 % recorded at 5 pm in the districts of Anantnag, Poonch, Kulgam and districts of Rajouri and Shopian partially, the highest since 1989 i.e, in 35 years. For the Srinagar Lok Sabha seat in the Kashmir region, polling for the fourth phase was on May 13. While the notification issued on April 18. the last date for nomination filing was April 25. The last date for withdrawal of candidature was April 29. Srinagar PC records highest poll percentage of 37.99. Lok Sabha elections 2024 were counted in June 4 with the rest of the Lok Sabha constituencies of India.

1) You use an intriguing phrase "find your drumbeat". What does it signify?

2) In Goonj 2024, you said that you would abolish the conservative approach to examinations if you had the power. What alternatives or modifications would you recommend?

The typical method of assessment often boils down to rote memorization, where stu-dents regurgitate memorized information onto the answer sheet in hopes of securing a passing grade or even topping the class. In this system, real understanding, practical application, and genuine learning often take a back seat, causing undue stress and anxiety for many students, myself included. This approach aligns more closely with the true essence of education: learning and application. By en-gaging in hands-on projects and collaborative activities, students not only deepen their understanding but also cultivate essential skills and knowledge that are relevant to real world scenarios. This shift in assessment methodology promotes a more holistic approach to learning, one that encourages students to find their unique rhythm, their drumbeat, and follow it to reach their fullest potential. By championing the DYD program, I aim to break free from this restrictive mindset. I provide students with the freedom to explore, create, and innovate-to be

themselves authentically. In doing so, I believe we are not only revolutionizing the way students are assessed but also redefining the purpose of education itself. It's about nurturing individuals who are not just proficient in reciting facts but are capable of navigating the complexities of the world with confidence, creativity, and compassion.

3) College on Wheels, which is your creation, is consistent with your overarching vision of education that extends beyond the classroom. How?

Mahatma Gandhi emphasized the importance of practical, hands-on learning, highlighting its enduring value over theoretical knowledge confined to textbooks and examinations. In response to this disconnect between traditional education and practical skills, we launched the College on Wheels initiative. This innovative program aimed to showcase the importance of practical education by transforming an entire train into a mobile college. The train was equipped with a library, WiFi, and laptops, providing students with a conducive environment for learning while on the move. Students were selected based on their project proposals, ensuring that only those with a genuine interest and commitment to learning were part of this transformative journey. This journey lies in experiences that challenge and inspire us to grow, both personally and professionally.

village. The famous Guchchi vegetable is highly valued in the area for its medicinal properties. Another famous destination here is the village of Meer. This village is mostly of hilly terrain and only a very small portion is used for agriculture. Here, the famous Sankari Devta temple has idols of deities which are known to be of Shiva and Shakti. The temple is said to be about more than 500 years old. The famous Sankari mela is also organised in the month of August or September in which a huge crowd of people come together and take the blessing of Baba Sankri. Visitors can enjoy the rich folk music, dance, and other cultural traditions. One of the most prominent traditional folk dance forms that the people of the pahari community mainly perform is characterized by rhythmic and energetic movements accompanied by beats, dhol and a traditional drum. It is not only a form of entertainment but also holds cultural and social significance, as it reflects the traditions

and customs of the pahari community. They can also take part in agrofarm tourism activities, where they can learn about farming practices like milking cows, making butter, visiting water mills, watching flour mills in action, using handlooms, and raising sheep. The famous local dishes of the panchari are rajma chawal, makki ki roti, sarson ka saag, kladi, paneer, makhan and many others which are very delicious and nutritious. ANARDANA (DHAARU): A Hidden Gem of Ramban District

This wild sour pomegranate not only famous for its taste, cures stomach and kidney

Jammu: Ramban district, nestled in landscapes of Jammu and Kashmir, has recently gained recognition for its Indigenous produce - Anardana, known locally as Daaru. This wild sour pomegranate variety has not only captivated the taste buds but also emerged as a significant economic asset for the region. With the granting of the Geographical Indication (GI) tag in October 2023, the spotlight has turned towards Ramban's thriving Anardana industry, which produced a staggering 866.3 metric tons during the 2022-2023 period. Anardana, or Daaru as it is called in the Pahari and Sarazi languages, grows abundantly across the Mid Himalayan hill slopes of Jammu and Kashmir, particularly in Ramban district. The fruit, rich in antioxidants and medicinal properties, flourishes in the mid-temperate to subtropical climate, primarily on calcareous low-fertility soils. Spanning over 365.75 hectares of hill slopes in various areas like Batote, Champa, Peera, Chanderkote, and others, the cultivation of Daaru in-

volves around 1350 farmer families. The harvesting season, from March to April, witnesses the collection of ripe fruits, which are then processed to obtain the dried arils, commonly known as Anardana. This distinctive sour taste makes Anardana a sought-after ingredient in culinary preparations, including chutneys, stuffings, and traditional dishes like chat. Moreover, the fruit's rind holds medicinal value and is utilized in herbal formulations to treat various ailments, from stomach infections to dental issues. The socioeconomic impact of Anardana cultivation is profound, with many rural households depending on it for their livelihoods. The annual income generated from Anardana collection and trade significantly contributes to the household economy, with villages like Kanga emerging as major hubs of Anardana production. Efforts to enhance farmer's income.
