
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# Yoga: A Way of Living

# **Kishtwar's Cultural Route: A** Symbol of Unity and Tradition

The Machail Mata Yatra is more than a pilgrimage. It offers a deep spiritual and cultural experience in the stunning Himalayas of Jammu and Kashmir. Each year, thousands of devotees trek to the sacred shrine of goddess Chandi (Durga) that is located in the remote Machail village. Beyond its spiritual significance, it showcases the depth of intangible cultural heritage, representing age-old beliefs, oral traditions, music, folklore, and community spirit.

Shri Machail Mata Shrine and the History associated with it:-

The Machail Mata shrine is situated at an altitude of around 2,800 meters in the village of Machail, within the Paddar Valley of Kishtwar district in the Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir. The temple is open only during the summer months of July and August. The 'Charri Yatra'/the ritual of carrying the holy mace (Charri) from Jammu to Machail marks the ceremonial heart of this event. Geographically, the Paddar valley occupies the north-eastern region of the Kishtwar district. It shares its northern boundary with the Zanskar region of Ladakh, its eastern boundary with the Pangi region of Himachal Pradesh, and its western boundary with the Marwah-Wadwan area. To the south, the valley is bordered by the districts of Basholi and Ramnagar within Jammu and Kashmir.



Early traditions of the Kishtwar region associate the land with a hermit named Sher Pal, who is said to have established the first settlement in the area. This hermit was a devotee of Goddess Kali, and his hermitage attracted many pilgrims. Later, the area corresponding to present-day Kishtwar is said to have been annexed by the King of Suru in Ladakh, remaining under Tibetan occupation for a considerable time. The town at that time was called Bhotnagar, which was later renamed Kishtwar. Kishtwar remained an independent princi-pality until it was annexed to the Jammu Kingdom in 1821. It later became a tehsil of Udhampur district until 1948, after which it became part of the erstwhile Doda district. In 2007, it was established as a district of Jammu province

The commencement of the Machail Mata pilgrimage as an organized annual religious event of 43 days is attributed to Thakur Kulbir Singh of Bhaderwah, who served in the Jammu and Kashmir Police and was stationed in Machail. He began this tradition in 1981. Under his initiative, the pilgrimage evolved into a significant religious tradition, attracting devotees not only from across the Union Territory of Jammu and Kashmir but also from other parts of India and among the Indian diaspora abroad.

The popularity of the pilgrimage is evident from the fact that in 2018 alone, more than one hundred thousand pilgrims visited the shrine before the arrival of the charri/mace yatra from Chinote, Bhadarwah to Kishtwar on August 18. Since the start of the pilgrimage on July 25, 2018, official data shows that a total of 1, 50,208 pilgrims, including 64406 males, 55288 females, 30398 children, and 116 sadhus, paid their respects at the shrine. Data for the years 2019 and 2020 could not be collected because the pilgrimage to the shrine was disrupted in 2019 due to security reasons and in 2020 due to COVID-19. In recent years, the pilgrimage has witnessed remarkable growth, with the number of devotees rising from 58,000 in 2022 to nearly 2 lakh in 2023-24. Backed by Vedic myths, spiritual beliefs, and astronomical references, existence of Maa Chandi transcends time. This religious pilgrimage site of the Jammu region has been evolving as a major spiritual and adventurous journey. The route becomes more significant in that it facilitates the pilgrimage to the temple of the goddess Chandi of



Machail.

As the route is important for the locals and people from outside the area, it has many intangible cultural aspects associated with it, which are discussed below: The Machail Pilgrimage (Charri Yatra) and

Social Practices/Rituals Associated with It: The Machail pilgrimage makes the Paddar valley more popular among pilgrims. The pilgrimage commences in the month of August every year. Surrounding the area of Machail pilgrimage route, are number of hot (Tatta Pani) and cold springs which flow intermittently. These springs are called miracles of nature and are considered sacred. Springs in Kishtwar region have a special significance, as these are associated with the Naga worship in the region. Local communities of the area are bhots, thakurs, padyar, nagseni, galheri, doolwal and Padderi. Influence of various cultures, because of its close proximity to Bhadarwah, Tibet, Basholi, and Himachal Pradesh is quite visible in the local heritage of the area.

The pilgrimage to Machail over a period of time has gained popularity throughout the country as well as abroad, though before 1980, its popularity was con-fined to the Padar region only. The annual pilgrimage in the form of Charri commences in the month of August from Chinote, in Bhadarwah, in which thousands of pilgrims pay obeisance to the goddess. The devotees participate in the pilgrimage along the mace or holi Charri of Machail Mata. They sing bhajans in praise of the goddess Chandi amidst beating of drums, playing upon flutes and chanting of mantras. In fact, the pilgrimage starts with the Jagrata/ Jagran of the Mata, which continues for the whole night. TrishoolBhent Yatra' is an important component of Machail pilgrimage in which Shimal Jain, a businessman from district Doda (J&K) present the main trishool / Charri for the pilgrimage.

Nowadays, however, the pilgrimage is also taken out from the Lakshmi Narayan Mandir (Pacca Danga) of Jammu. The temple has a Chandi temple within its premises. This Chandi(diety in the Machail temple) temple was inaugurated on March 1, 1997 by Thakur Kulbir Singh Jamwal. The devotees after paying obeisance to the Goddess join the pilgrimage at Chinote in Bhaderwah, from where it takes off to Kishtwar and then to Atholi in Paddar. Thousands of devotees welcome the 'Holy mace'/Charri Yatra en-route by offering free Langars at Gulabgarh, Massu, Kundhail, Chishoti, Hamori and Machail.



A blend of various cultures- Naga, Hindu, Buddhist, and Islamic is quite visible in the local heritage along the route, which starts from Chinote in Bhadarwah. Bhadarwah, since ancient times, has been a Naga worship region with Nagas emerging as their main local deity. This becomes apparent from the number of Naga shrines spread throughout the length and breadth of Badarwah, and which are also sprinkled over to the adjoining areas like Kishtwar. Chinote, the base camp of Machail pilgrimage finds mention in the folklore of Bhadarwah in connection with the Naga deity in Vasikdehra (Bhadarwah) wherein it is also mentioned that the King of Badarwah prayed to Goddess Chandi for the safety of the valley.

Though the Goddess Chandi abodes at many places all over the UT, it is however, manifested at Machail. In the region of Paddar, where the Machail temple is located, one can see the influence of Himachal as well as Tibetan cultures. People in the area have Tibetan features and dress the Tibetan way. This is so because of its close proximity to Tibet. Moreover, parts of Tibet (Baltistan or Little Tibet) and Paddar were annexed with Kishtwar by Zorawar Singh, the General of Ma-haraja Gulab Singh in the 19th century and this might be one of the reasons for the adoption of Tibetan fea-tures by the people of Paddar (Kishtwar). Associated to the melas and festivals, there are many rituals which are performed along with the dance Diku and music called Dhouns.

The beliefs and faith of communities along the Machail route have given rise to numerous local deities and rituals like Jatr/Jatran and Zagroo. These are closely linked to agricultural and social life. Farming begins in Chet and ends in Magher, divided into two phases-sowing to 'gudai' and autumn harvest. The intervening period is marked by joy and celebration through local fairs and festivals known as Jatars. Popu-lar Jatars include Hirai, Rotran, Shadu, and Malcheh. A resident of the Kishtwar belt named Akshay Sharma had briefed about this local festival. It is an

annual ritual performed by families in honour of their Kula Devta/Devi (family deity)—Naga Devta, Chandi mata, or Lord Shiva. The event involves inviting relatives and villagers, with the deity carried in a palanquin, followed by the Chela, who enters a trance to deliver prophecies and guidance believed to come from the deity. The earliest records to it dates back to the 17th century when Raja Bhagwan Singh of Kishtwar initiated the Kantak Jatar mela to commemorate the defeat of the Balauria troops by the Mughal army. Another significant ritual. Zagroo or Jagara, involves the village priest (Dewala) and Chela walking barefoot on burning embers. The ceremony begins with a sacrificial offering, followed by a feast, devotional songs. and the offering of Rot to the deity. It concludes with trance, dance, and music using Dhouns, Narsingha, and flute. The cultural landscape of Kishtwar also incorporates ritualistic practices such as Poothchwar, wherein Bhootdevta is invoked to ward off witchcraft and malevolent forces. The sacrificial rite, followed by a communal meal conducted within the animal shed, exemplifies the fusion of spiritual protection and social cohesion in local belief systems.

In the present context of preserving the cultural heritage and building sustainable communities, the Machail Mata pilgrimage route and the intangible heritage of the Kishtwar region play a dynamic force to sustain collective memories, reinforce social cohesion, and embody the region's living cultural identity.
