## ICccR-HRM conduct Industry Immersion Programme for MBA (IB) students

The industry immersion visit aimed to bridge the gap between academic learning and real-world industrial experience, providing students with an in-depth understanding of manufacturing, logistics, and international business practices through visits to prominent industries in Ludhiana, Punjab.

Day 1: Industry Interaction and Export Insights

Interactive session was held at the Chamber of Industrial and Commercial Undertakings (CICU), Ludhiana. Students interacted with Upkar Singh Ahuja, President, CICU, and Honey Sethi, General Secretary, CICU, who elaborated on India's export ecosystem,

competitiveness, and the importance of maintaining Quality, Cost, and Delivery (QCD) standards in international business. A specialized session on export documentation and trade procedures followed, conducted by the CICU management team, offering students valuable insights into international trade operations.

Day 2: Exploring Logistics and Manufacturing Excellence

On the second day, students visited Hind Terminals Pvt. Ltd., an inland container depot (dry port) in Ludhiana. The visit provided firsthand exposure to the processes involved in exportimport logistics, including container handling, documentation, cost structures, and multimodal transport operations.

Later, students toured Vardhman Spinning and General Mills, the flagship manufacturing unit of the Vardhman Group, established in 1962.

Day 3: Learning from Market Leaders

The third day featured a visit to Hero Cycles, one of India's oldest and most reputed cycle manufacturers. Established in 1956, the plant has an annual production capacity of 7.5 million cycles.

Students gained exposure to advanced manufacturing techniques such as forging, welding, electroplating, and powder coating, and learned about Hero's international expansion through acquisitions like Avocet Sports (UK), HNF (Germany), and Firefox Bikes (India).

Bridging Academia and Industry

The immersion programme proved to be a highly enriching experience, enabling students to gain a practical understanding of modern industrial systems and management practices.

The exposure to multiple sectors—textiles, manufacturing, logistics, and food processing—helped students connect their academic learning with onground realities of global business operations.

Prof. Hardeep Chahal, Director, ICccR & HRM, expressed heartfelt gratitude to all hosting organizations for their collaboration and hospitality.

The Faculty of Mathematical Science organized an Induction Program for the newly admitted students of the Five-Year Integrated UG-PG Program in Mathematical Science

The program, which marks the beginning of an exciting academic journey for the first batch of this newly launched interdisciplinary course, was held in the presence of distinguished academicians and university officials.

The Hon'ble Vice Chancellor, Prof. Umesh Rai, graced the occasion as the Chief Guest. In his inaugural address, Prof. Rai congratulated the students for being part of this pioneering initiative under the Faculty of Mathematical Sciences. Prof. Rai complimented the faculty for launching an innovative and forward-looking initiative that truly reflects the spirit of the National Education Policy (NEP)

Addressing the newly admitted students, he said that the programme embodies the essence of experiential and problem-solving education, encouraging learners to move beyond rote learning towards knowledge that emerges through practice and observation.

Acharya Vinoba Quoting Bhave, Prof. Rai underlined that true education begins when curiosity replaces conditioning and learning extends beyond text-

### PM's Mission Education, Skilled Youth

India's journey toward becoming a developed nation by 2047 rests on one central idea: empowering its young people through meaningful education and real-world skills. At the heart of this national effort is Prime Minister Narendra Modi's call for a future where every student has access to quality learning and practical opportunities that help them grow, contribute, and lead.

The National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 remains the backbone of this vision. It pushes India toward a system that blends Indian values with modern demands, nurturing students who can think critically, work across disciplines, and adapt to a rapidly changing world. From foundational learning to cutting-edge research, the NEP sets the tone for a more

confident and capable generation.

A closer look at the Prime Minister's recent initiatives shows how deeply this commitment is being shaped into action. The launch of the Pradhan Mantri Vidyalaxmi (PM-Vidyalaxmi) scheme is a major step forward. Projects worth over ₹62,000 crore—including the PM-SETU scheme– demonstrate the scale at which the government aims to build a skilled and future-ready workforce. The setting up of 1,200 Vocational Skill Labs in areas like IT, automotive, and agriculture shows a clear shift toward hands-on, industry-relevant training. New facilities across Bihar's universities, the inauguration of the new NIT Patna campus in Bihta, and the establishment of the Jan Nayak Karpoori Thakur Skill University further add to this growing ecosys-

The #ViksitBharatBuildathon2025 has been another encouraging moment. By inviting school students from classes 6 to 12 to propose ideas for an AtmanirbharBharat, the initiative recognises young minds as creators, not just learners. Their interaction with the Prime Minister offered a glimpse of how India's next generation is being encouraged to inno-

vate early.

In several of his recent addresses, including the International Aryan Summit on October 31, 2025, the Prime Minister underlined the relevance of Maharshi Dayanand Saraswati's teachings. His emphasis on an education system rooted in Indian principles and cultural confidence echoes a broader national aspiration: development that is modern in approach but Indian at heart.

The announcement of 85 new Kendriya Vidyalayas also reflects a sincere push to widen access, especially in areas where quality schooling is still limited. Together, these initiatives speak of a government that sees education and skill-building not as isolated sectors, but as the foundation for a stronger, self-

reliant Índia.

As universities across the country—including ours—work to align programmes with national goals, the message is clear. The road to Viksit Bharat will be shaped by how well we educate, inspire, and equip our youth today. PM Modi's vision challenges us to rethink the way we learn and teach, and to ensure that every student—whether in a village, a small town, or a university campus—feels included in India's growth story. The future belongs to nations that invest in their young people. India has chosen that path with conviction. # BEYOND THE TEXTBOOK: THE URGENT NEED FOR A MORAL CURRICULUM

In an age where technological advancement and information access have reached unprecedented heights, one would expect humanity to be at its moral zenith. Yet, amidst this progress, the headlines of leading news reports tell a different tale—rising violence, apathy, corruption, greed, addiction and a growing disconnect between personal success and social responsibility. This moral vacuum, particularly evident among sections of the younger generation commonly referred as Gen Z, compels us to pause and question the efficacy of our current substance and pedagogy of instructions at schools, colleges and university level.

Education, once envisioned as the sacred process of nurturing both intellect, health and character, It was enrichment of mind, soul and body all together. On the contrary, in present times, it has increasingly been resulted and viewed as a mechanical exercise aimed at producing employable graduates. Marks have superseded morals, and competition has eclipsed empathy. The consequence is an alarming erosion of ethical sensitivity, character and civic duty among our youth. It is, therefore, imperative that we revisit our educational philosophy—not merely to reform it, but to realign it with the timeless values of human dignity, morality, cooperation and ethical reasoning.

### Beyond Law: From Deterrence to Conscience

It is commonly believed that in a civilised society a robust legal and regulatory framework is the ultimate safeguard against deviance. While such systems are undoubtedly necessary, they are reactive by design. Laws can punish transgressions but rarely cultivate conscience. True integrity is not born from the fear of external punishment, but from an internal moral compass. A legalistic approach can set the floor for human behavior, but it cannot inspire us to reach for the ceiling of our humanity. New forms of punishment like community service and several new offences have been introduced under BNS which marks the shift from deterrence to civic responsibility.

Thus, a deeper, more enduring transformation must begin much earlier—in classrooms, playgrounds, and homes. We must equip young minds not just with the knowledge of what is right, but with the wisdom to understand why Without this ethical grounding, even the most educated individuals may succumb to corruption, deceit, greed or apathy when faced with moral ambiguity.

Ethical Dimension of Learning:

Moral and ethical education should not be confined to a single discipline or a moral science period tucked away in the weekly timetable. Instead, it must become the invisible thread woven through every aspect of learning—whether in mathematics, law, literature, or science. A physics experiment can teach honesty and precision; a lesson on constitution can provoke reflection on justice and human rights; a group project can cultivate respect and teamwork.

At the heart of this transformation is the teacher—not merely as conveyors of information, but living exemplars who model integrity, empathy, and respect. Their words and interactions, both inside and outside the

classroom, shape young hearts more powerfully than any textbook ever could.

Embracing Experiential Learning: NEP 2020 as a Guiding Light:

National Education Policy (NEP) 2020 offers a promising framework to infuse values and ethics into mainstream education through experiential learning. It envisions classrooms where students "learn by doing," reflecting the real-world complexities of cooperation, decision-making, and problem-solving. But to truly realize this vision, we must go beyond superficial adoption of activities and projects.

Experiential learning, in its truest sense, is about engagement with life and environment. When students participate in community service, environmental conservation drives, or visit to prisons, old age homes and Child Care Institutions, they learn empathy not from lectures but from lived experience surrounding environment. They begin to understand the interdependence of human existence—the realization that one's wellbeing is inextricably linked with that of others.

Similarly, problem-solving exercises can be framed to include ethical considerations. For instance, a science project on water purification can simultaneously explore equitable access to clean water. Decision-making simulations can help students understand the moral consequences of choices, fostering accountability and foresight.

Situated along the Central Asian Flyway, this 80-acre wetland provides critical habitat for over 35 species of water birds and an equal number of wetlandassociated species.

The adjoining agricultural mosaic further supports more than 160 bird species, including a variety of raptors, he added.

The students identified the bird species based on their morphological features and uploaded the checklists to e-Bird, an online citizen science database.

Following observation activity, students undertook a cleanliness drive across the wetland to



reinforce the conservation through action.
