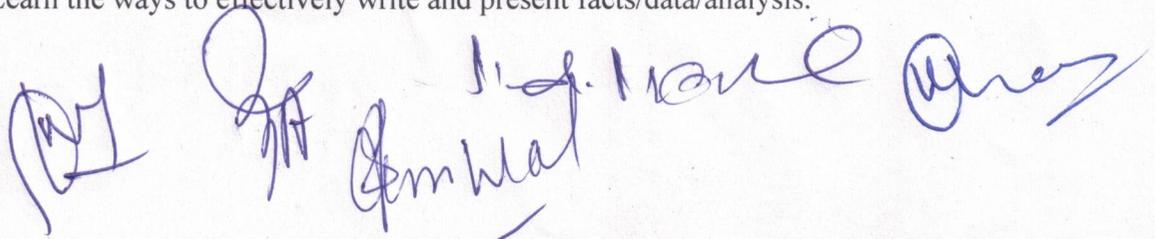
Course Objectives:

The aim of this course is to help students to address research problems effectively, accurately and holistically. It is aimed to provide students with methodological knowledge and research design skills that can help them in understanding, analyzing, writing and presenting research in an efficient manner. The following are the key objectives:

- To introduce students to the research methods used while doing research in their respective area studies/world politics
- To introduce students to the relevant key concepts required for their PhD research including literature review, collecting data, fact-finding, effective analysis, and research writing
- To familiarize students with various theories of international relations that need to be applied during research for building appropriate conceptual framework
- To evaluate the application of different research methodologies to the analysis of discourses of world politics

- Understand the basics of the critical analysis in their respective research.
