MINOR TEST: I & II

Section B will consist of seven short answer type questions, out of which the candidate will be required to answer any five questions. Each question will carry 2 marks (2x5=10).

MAJOR TEST

The question paper for Major Test will consist of two sections A and B.

Section A will consist of eight long answer-type questions, two questions from each unit. The candidate would be required to answer four questions selecting one from each unit. Each question will carry 12 marks (12 X 4= 48).

Section B will consist of eight short answer-type questions, four each from two units, not covered in Minor Tests. The candidate would be required to answer four questions, selecting at least two from each unit. Each question will carry 3 marks (4 X 3=12).
